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
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Home – School Agreement 2024

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About our school

Our School

Balfour Junior School is a community junior coeducational school catering for 480 pupils of 7-11 years of age. The school values its place as an integral part of the multicultural community offering the pupils a friendly, supportive and inclusive atmosphere to work in.

Balfour Junior School joined Beyond Schools Trust in January 2017.

Balfour staff are committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and expect all staff and volunteers to share in our commitment.

The school is housed in a one-storey building, close to the town centre, train station and bus station. The site also has the benefit of extensive outdoor spaces, which we use to enhance learning as much as possible.

The School Day

Pupils may arrive on the site and wait in the playground with their parents from	8.30 am
The whistle is blown and children are led in to class at	8.40 am
the register is taken at	8.50 am
Break time	10.45-11.00 am
Lunch time	12.20–1.20 pm
School finishes at	3.30 pm

At the end of the day children are collected from the playground, observing the one-way system, entering the gates to the left of the main school building and leaving through the gates to the right.

Admissions

Pupils transferring from Infant schools in September have the opportunity to visit in the Summer Term to become familiar with their new surroundings.

Children joining at other times are invited, with their parents, for a guided tour of the school with the Head Teacher.

All applications for admissions should be made via the School Office on 01634 843833 or Admissions Department at Medway Council.

Security

During school hours it is only possible to enter by the front door. Please report to the office as soon as you enter the building.



About our school

Parking

We highly recommend walking to and from school whenever possible. The school entrance can get heavily congested at the beginning and end of the school day and parking is very limited on the local residential streets. We have no parking facilities onsite for parents.

Parking on zigzag lines outside the school is not permitted during the times specified on the road signs. If you do bring your child to school by car, please find a safe place to park.



Bicycles and Scooters

Bicycles and scooters can be ridden to and from school and can be left in the racks available. Please ensure they are locked and not ridden when on the school grounds.

Animals

Dogs and other animals are not permitted on the site at any time.

School Meals

Meals are provided to pupils by Independent Catering, a catering company who operate the kitchen within the school. A varied menu is provided and can be found on the school website. Please visit www.independentcatering.co.uk/ for more details.

Meals are paid for via the ParentPay app, our cashless payment system. Please note that we do not accept cash payments for school meals. We are happy to help you to set up ParentPay and give support with how to make payments.

Some children are entitled to free school meals. Parents/Carers must apply online via Medway Council's website. Please speak to the school office for further details.

Packed Lunches

Children may bring a packed lunch. Please pack it in a strong container clearly marked with your child's name and class.

Fizzy drinks, energy drinks and sweets are not permitted.

Morning Snack

Children are allowed to bring a healthy snack for morning break time. The following snacks are permitted:

- Fruit (fresh or dried)
- Vegetables (e.g. carrot sticks)
- Plain crackers or breadsticks

Other foods are not permitted for break time snacks.

Drinks

Children should bring a named water bottle with them every day; these can be refilled in school.

No squash or flavoured water please. However, children may bring squash or a still drink to have with their packed lunch.

The School Community

Parents and the school

The school encourages the partnership between home and school and an agreement for you to sign and return is included in your welcome pack.

We are always happy to discuss any problems or concerns. Class teachers may be *briefly* contacted before or after school, but it would be helpful if a prior appointment for a longer discussion could be made by letter or telephone to avoid any interruption to lessons. Class teachers are not available after 8.50 am.

Safeguarding

Our school is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people and expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment. We strive to ensure that consistent effective safeguarding procedures are in place to support families, children and staff at school.

Our Designated Safeguarding Lead is Zoe Mayston – Headteacher.

The Deputy Designated Safeguarding Leads are Gary Kirk, Bethany Kember, Rebecca Denny and Lawrence Tutt.

Our Chair of Governors, Phillip Heard, has governor responsibility for Safeguarding.

Pastoral Care

The school is a caring community and we have an excellent pastoral team. The class teacher will deal with all routine matters affecting your child's welfare. Phase Leaders maintain the oversight of the welfare of all pupils in their year groups. They can be contacted directly in matters of a serious concern.

Our Family Liaison Officer is Rebecca Denny, who the children know as Becky. She is available to offer advice and support to our children and their families.

Becky aims to help overcome any difficulties or barriers which may affect the children's wellbeing and experience of school, for example: working on friendship issues, behaviour problems, attendance or self-esteem, through to family worries such as debt, bereavement and relationship changes.

Breakfast Club and After-School club are run by MFSE and available daily at a competitive price. Breakfast Club is open from 7:30am and the pupils are brought over to class for the start of the school day.

Friends of Balfour (FOB)

The Parent Association (PA) is a fund-raising committee run by parents of children in the school. It organises a range of social events for the benefit of everyone in the school community.

FOB actively supports the school through its fund-raising efforts and it raises money for all those extras that enhance the children's lives in school.

The success of FOB depends entirely on the support of all parents. We greatly appreciate any assistance. This can be anything from a little time helping out, to coming along to support the functions with family and friends.

School Parliament

At Balfour Juniors, we teach pupils about responsibility early on in their education. Our school council is made up of representatives across the school and they meet regularly. The school council contribute towards giving our children a voice in the decisions we make in school. They organise and promote events and charity work and discuss ways in which the school can improve the school as well as the local community.

Red Caps

Pupils in Year 6 are chosen to hold the responsibility of being a Red Cap. Red Cap pupils wear their red caps and ties with pride and undertake various roles around school, helping others and being role models of exemplary attitudes and behaviour.



School Houses

All pupils are members of one of the school's four houses. They are able to earn house-points for working hard and showing good behaviours and attitudes. At the end of each term, the children from the house with the most house-points enjoy a special reward. The four houses are Earth, Air, Fire and Water and we aim to place siblings in the same house.



The Curriculum

The Curriculum

In order to achieve the school's aims children are taught a broad and balanced curriculum, covering all areas of the National Curriculum. All our curriculum maps and policies are available for parents to view on our school website.

Character Education

At Balfour Juniors, we believe that the experiences provided for children in their primary years has a significant impact on their future wellbeing and success.

It is for this reason, we have made a whole school commitment to the teaching and development of character traits, values and behaviours which underpin achievement and success; striving to ensure that developing 'character' goes hand in hand with high educational aspirations and achievement.

Character can be **caught** through a strong school community of positive relationships and clearly defined values. Character education can be **taught** through the curriculum using teaching and learning strategies, activities, and resources. Character can be **sought** through chosen experiences that occur within and outside of the formal curriculum. We provide experiences during and outside the school day that broaden pupils' passions and interests

Religious Education: This is a statutory requirement for all pupils (except where parents request otherwise) and is taught according to the Medway Agreed Syllabus. Parents who do not wish their child to be taught the Agreed Syllabus or take part in acts of worship on the grounds of personal belief should contact the Head Teacher.

Physical education or sports activities are undertaken every week. All children are required to wear their P.E. kit to school on the days their class has a P.E. lesson (see P.E. Kit). All children will participate in all activities unless there is a medical reason and written advice is received from the parent.



Home Learning

All children are expected to read for at least 20 minutes every night, learn spellings and practise times tables (which can be done through playing Times Table Rockstars). As children progress through the school, they may be asked to carry out research for projects.

Educational Visits

These are an essential part of the children's learning in order for them to learn by practical first-hand experience. Parents are asked to make a non-refundable voluntary contribution to cover the costs of these activities. Visits may have to be cancelled if there is a lack of contributions. Parents having financial difficulty may contact the school office to speak to our Family Liaison officer for advice

School Values

We teach and reinforce the school's values through lessons, assemblies, special events and awards. The following values are the focus in each term:



The Curriculum

Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

The school has a positive approach towards supporting children with additional needs. Children experiencing learning difficulties are given learning programmes to help meet their individual needs.

Parents who are concerned about their child's progress should, in the first instance, contact the class teacher. The Special Educational Needs Coordinator is also available to discuss concerns. If the school has any concerns about a pupil's progress parents will be informed.

In line with the Disability Discrimination Act we make every reasonable effort to include all children in our school regardless of disability.

The school has an Accessibility Plan in place to allow for the inclusion of all children.

Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

The relationships and sex education programme is in line with government guidance and is approved by the school's governing body. Age appropriate lessons focusing on building and maintaining healthy relationships are taught in every year group. the key building blocks of healthy, respectful relationships, focusing on family and friendships sit alongside the essential understanding of how to be healthy.

Parents are always informed in writing before the lessons relating to puberty and sex education are delivered and are given the opportunity to discuss any questions with the year group staff. While lessons which teach about health and relationships are statutory, parents have the right to request that their child be withdrawn from some or all of sex education, which is taught in Year 6.

Organisation of classes

Each class is made up of a single age group and within each class there will be a range of abilities. Pupils within one class will progress at different rates. The teachers are aware of this and work is adapted to the needs of individual pupils.

The teachers in each year group meet regularly to plan and evaluate to ensure continuity and consistency of the quality of education.

Extra-Curricular Activities

All pupils are offered the opportunity to join a variety of clubs and activities which take place either during lunch time or after school. These activities are organised voluntarily by school staff in addition to their normal commitments and are usually free of charge.

Some after-school clubs are run by external providers and may incur a charge.

Pupils taking part in these activities will bring home a form which will need to be signed and returned to school. The form will give information about the day and time of the club.

If after school clubs need to be cancelled, pupils will be informed in school and parents will be advised via ParentPay.



Sports Competitions

As part of the extra curricular activities, the school enters teams in the local leagues and the Medway Mini Youth Games. The children wear their PE kits but are also loaned a school kit. Parental support is always welcome at these matches.

watches are worn to school, they will be removed for PE lessons.

One small pair of stud earrings is allowed, but we do ask parents to ensure they are removed on days when their child has swimming or PE.

General Information

School Uniform

There is a school uniform which all pupils are expected to wear. The wearing of uniform encourages the children to take a pride in the school. All items except the school tie and sweatshirt (obtainable from School Time) can be purchased in most children's clothes stores.

- Grey or black skirt or trousers (tailored shorts in summer, if required)
- White shirt with collar
- School tie
- White polo shirt (summer wear only)
- Blue and white gingham dress (summer wear only)
- Royal blue V-neck sweatshirt or cardigan
- Fleece (optional) outdoor wear only, not to be worn in class
- Flat black shoes not trainers or boots

Winter uniform is required in terms 2, 3, and 4, while summer uniform can be worn in terms 1, 5 and 6.

Pupils are encouraged to wear a hat when outdoors during the summer term.

All pupils with long hair should have it tied back.

Any clothing that is required for religious purposes should be in Balfour Junior School colours.

Jewellery

The wearing of jewellery is not permitted (with cultural exception) for the reasons of safety. If

- Plain white T-shirt

All clothing, including coats and bags, should be <u>clearly labelled</u> with your child's name and class.

Pupils in year 5 will have swimming lessons; these incur a minimal charge.



Personal Property

Marking clothes and other property with your child's name and class is of the greatest importance and parents should ensure that all property brought into school is clearly labelled with their child's name and class.

We do our best to ensure that all items which are handed in are returned to their owner.

Pupils should not bring belongings such as pencil cases, toys or trading cards into school. We cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage to personal property of pu

General Inform

Attendance

We believe that children have the right to attend school regularly and it is the parent's responsibility to ensure they do so.

The expected attendance for all pupils is 96% or above. Low school attendance has a detrimental effect upon pupils' education and attainment. Schools are open to children for 190 days per year. 95% attendance means 10 days/2 weeks of learning have been missed. 90% attendance is the equivalent of 20 days/4 weeks absence.





If you have any problems getting your child into school, please let us know as good communication is vital. Medical evidence will be required to authorise absences if your child's attendance falls below 95%.

Absence from school:

Please use Studybugs, our absence reporting app, to report your child's absence. The app is free and easy to use; it transfers absence

Medical / dental appointments:

Please avoid these during the school day. For appointments during school time copies of appointment cards/letters will be requested in advance.

Emergency Contact

Reliable telephone contact numbers <u>must</u> be provided for each child for emergencies. Please update the information via the school office if you change address, or there are changes to names or phone numbers of contacts.

First Aid

Minor injuries, e.g. cuts and grazes, are dealt with by qualified first aiders. If a serious injury occurs, we will contact parents and we may seek medical advice or treatment.

Medication

Occasionally children need short-term medication whilst at school. The school is unable to administer antibiotics, so parents will need to make arrangements for doses to be given before and after school, or to come into school to administer the dosage

The only exception is if your child requires longterm daily medication (such as insulin). In this instance a Healthcare Plan will be agreed between school and parents. It is parents/carers responsibility to ensure that all medication is in date and provided to the school. i.e. asthma inhalers, EpiPens, Piriton etc.



al Information

Behaviour

In any community it is necessary to have rules. Our school rules are based on our school's values and ethos and are for the safety and general well-being of the children. The school follows its own positive behaviour policy which is available on our website.

If a child's behaviour is not acceptable over a period of time, a senior member of staff may request to see the parents/carers in order to discuss the matter further with them.

Good manners and respect for others are considered to be an essential basis of all relationships within the school and are regularly taught and reminded through the school's values.

Transfer to Secondary School

Applications for secondary school must be made online via Medway Council's website.

Towards the end of year 5, we will host an information meeting for parents/carers to advise them of the procedure and deadlines for transferring to secondary school. Information will be distributed to year 5 pupils, usually in term 5, informing parents about the meeting.

Pupils in their final year are eligible to be assessed for grammar school under Medway's Selection Procedure (The Medway Test); applications for the test must be made online via Medway Council's website. Full information is provided when applicable. We liaise closely with secondary schools to encourage a smooth transition procedure.
